### Things to remember

- **Park hours** – April 1 to Sept. 30, 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- **Winter schedule** – Oct. 1 to March 31, 8 a.m. to dusk.
- Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit [www.parks.state.wa.us](http://www.parks.state.wa.us) or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties, except sites designated as multiple campsites.
- Extra vehicle overnight - \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.



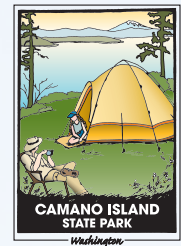
**The Discover Pass** is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

- Annual pass: \$30 • One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

# WELCOME TO CAMANO ISLAND

Camano Island State Park sits on the shores of Saratoga Passage with 6,700 feet of rocky shoreline and beach. The park provides sweeping views of Puget Sound, the Olympic and Cascade mountains, and Mount Rainier.

Visitors can spend a lazy day on the beach

watching boat traffic or hike the forest loop trails.

This 134-acre camping park offers a variety of recreational activities, including hiking, fishing, crabbing, boating, swimming and scuba diving. During the summer, park volunteers host interpretive programs for all ages.

## Overnight accommodations

The park offers several options for overnight stays. There are 88 standard campsites, many of which accommodate RVs up to 40 feet long, and two hiker/biker primitive sites. The park also offers a Cascadia Marine Trail campsite available to those arriving to the park in wind- and human-powered, beachable watercraft. Campsites are available first come, first served.

For those who want the comforts of home, Camano Island offers five cabins situated in a diverse mature forest area. Each cabin is 12-by-20 feet in size and furnished with one folding futon couch that sleeps two, one bunk bed that sleeps three and a table with five chairs. Some of the rustic furniture was custom made by local volunteers with wood milled from trees cleared at the park. Each cabin provides a fire ring, an upright pedestal grill, picnic table and an 8-foot covered porch. Cabin number 45 is accessible to people with disabilities. Pets are allowed in cabin number 44 with a \$15 (plus tax) pet fee per night. Bathrooms and showers are nearby.

The park also offers a group camp that accommodates a maximum of 100 guests. The group camping area has restrooms and showers. Fees vary with size of the group.

## Park History

During the last Ice Age, the area was covered by an ice sheet approximately one mile thick. The glacier carved the shape of the island with its high "feeder banks" that helped build the beaches.

The first European settlers came to the island in 1855 and began extensive logging operations. Farmers came later and developed the area agriculturally. The park was aquired in 4 parcels between 1958 and 1981.
