THINGS TO REMEMBER

- Park hours are 6:30 a.m. to dusk. March 15 to October 15th.
- Winter schedule: October 16 to March 14, 8 a.m. to dusk. For information about seasonal closures, visit parks.wa.gov.
- Reservations can be made up to nine months ahead online at <u>washington.goingtocamp.com</u> or by calling 888-CAMPOUT. Unreserved sites are available first come, first served (site information available at the registration booth).
- There's a 10-day camping limit between April 1 and Sept. 30. The rest of the year is a 20-day limit.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited.
- Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
 Fallen branches and debris need to be left on the forest floor to decay and nourish the plants and trees. Firewood is for sale at the camp host site.
- One camping party (a max of eight people) per site. Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m. and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- One vehicle allowed at each campsite. Extra vehicles are \$10 per night and must be parked in a designated area (or at the site if there's room on the parking pad). This doesn't apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites.
 Pet owners, including horse riders, must clean up after pets on all state park lands. Doggy bags are located throughout the park.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.
- Moorage fees are charged year round for mooring at dosck, floats and buoys from 1 p.m. to 8 a.m.





WELCOME TO PESHASTIN PINNACLES STATE PARK

Peshastin Pinnacles is a day-use park located in the foothills of the Cascade Mountains in Chelan County. The park features a group of sandstone slabs and spires called "the pinnacles." Climbable spires reach 200 feet into the air. Rocks and trails provide views of surrounding orchards, the Enchantment Mountain Range and the Wenatchee River Valley.

This 34-acre desert park is popular with hikers and climbers for its sweeping views of the Cascade Mountains and the Wenatchee River Valley. The park offers a 1.5-mile-steep hiking trail. For rock climbers, slabs and spires vary from easy to difficult and require rock-climbing equipment.

The park also offers wildlife viewing, picnicking and bird watching.
