

Welcome to Riverside

The Riverside State Park Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) Area is located west of Spokane on Inland Road. This 600-acre multi-use area was set aside in the 1980s for all types of ORVs. The area has proven to be very popular for motorcycles, ATVs, and four-wheelers. The terrain provides hill climbs, sand areas and trails through wooded areas.

The area includes restrooms, picnic tables, shelters, parking, and a loading/unloading ramp. ORVs (or OHVs as they are known in other places) must be trailered to get to the ORV area, unless they are street legal. Washington state park rangers patrol the ORV area and enforce rules and regulations.

Overnight accommodations

Camping is not allowed at the ORV Park; however, Riverside's Bowl & Pitcher Campground is 7 miles away. The campground has 16 standard (tent) campsites; 13 RV partial-hookup sites with electricity and water; two RV full-hookup sites with electricity, water, and sewer; and two cabins to accommodate up to five people. If space is available, drop-in campers are always welcome, but reservations offer peace of mind.

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

- Annual pass: \$30
 - One-day pass: \$10
- (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What phone number can I call for more information?

A: Please call Riverside State Park at (509) 465-5064.

Q: When is the ORV area open?

A: From April 1 through Sept. 30, the hours are 6:30 a.m. to dusk; Oct. 1 through March 31, the hours are 8 a.m. to dusk.

Q: Is there a cost to ride in the ORV Area?

A: There is no cost to ride but a Discover Pass is required for all street legal vehicles. All ORVs are required to have current tabs issued through the Department of Licensing.

Q: I'm from out of state, what are the special requirements to ride my ORV?

A: Registering your ORV with Washington Department of Licensing may be required. For more information, visit www.dol.wa.gov/vehicleregistration/licenseoffroad.html

Q: What age can I ride alone in the ORV Area?

A: 16 years and older may ride alone. Riders under 16 years of age must be supervised by an experienced rider 18 years of age or older. It is highly recommended that inexperienced riders also be accompanied by an experienced rider 18 years of age or older.

Q: What rules govern me as I ride?

A: All Washington state laws, rules listed in this brochure, and all posted signs in the ORV area.

Q: Does the ORV Area have clear trail markings?

A: No. Users ride at their own risk. The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission and Riverside State Park assume no liability for equipment damaged or injuries resulting from park use. Riders beware: If you don't know, don't go!

Q: What are the boundaries for the ORV area?

A: A double-rail fence surrounds the entire ORV area. Do not ride outside of the fenced area.

ORV operating requirements

- ORV permit tabs are required for operating any non-street-legal vehicle in the ORV Area.
- A U.S. Forest Service approved spark arrester is required and must be in working order. No modifications are permitted.
- ORVs are required to have an operating muffler device which is adequate and does not exceed noise standards of 105 decibels.
- ORV users are required to stay within the fenced boundaries.
- Only street-legal vehicles are permitted on Inland Road. ORVs can only be operated in designated areas.
- Riders must use a Washington State Department of Transportation (D.O.T.) approved helmet.

Beginner's riding area rules

- This area is intended for riders with a skill level of one year or less and small displacement ORV machines.
- Operators must always maintain control of ORV.
 - Ride within your skill level.
 - Stay on designated trails.
 - D.O.T. approved helmets required.
 - Adult supervision is required for operators under 16 years of age.

Safety tips

- Wear your helmet and other protective gear.
- Be sure your ORV is in good operating condition.
- Know your abilities and limitations.
- Be aware of other ORV users.
- When jumping hills, use spotters for your safety and the safety of others.
- Ride safely.

Restrictions

To protect water quality and resources, crossing Deep Creek is prohibited when water is flowing, usually in the spring when winter runoff occurs. Crossing the creek causes soil erosion and sedimentation, which affects water quality downstream. Oil and other petroleum products from ORVs also affect water quality.

To ensure future use of this area for everyone's enjoyment, please obey posted signs.

Things to remember

- Please check the park bulletin board for general regulations.
- Alcohol is prohibited in parking lots and riding areas.
 - Pets must always be on a leash and under control.
 - No open fires are allowed.
 - Place all litter in trash cans.

Help us conserve natural resources. State Parks encourages you to take your recyclables home with you or deposit them in the nearest recycling center. Not only will you help keep our parks beautiful, but you will lower garbage collection costs which in turn frees up dollars for maintenance and improvement projects.

Riverside State Park hours are 6:30 a.m. to dusk from April 1 through Oct. 31 and 8 a.m. to dusk from Nov. 1 through March 31.

Directions to the park

From Spokane: Take I-90 to exit 280, turn north off the exit ramp on Maple Street, continue 1.9 miles. Turn left on Northwest Boulevard, continue 2.4 miles, and road name changes to Assembly Street, continue 1 mile. Turn left (NW) on Nine Mile Road (Hwy 291), continue 2.2 miles, turn left (west) on Seven Mile Road, continue 2.1 miles. Turn left (south) on Inland Road, continue .7 miles to staging area.
