# Westport Light State Park Public Comments

## September 4 – October 10, 2025

I oppose the construction of a golf course.

I would ask the commission to consider the agenda of the stakeholders involved. There is no denying that Scotch broom is abundant and invasive at Westport Light. There is also no denying that the ecosystem that exists now is not the ecosystem that originally existed at the site of the park. These are not arguments for why a golf course should be built, but for why there needs to be a management strategy for the park in order to reflect the desires of the City of Westport residents and reflect the mission and core values of Washington State Parks. While I cannot speak broadly or specifically for the residents of Westport, I can pose to you the values of Washington State Parks:

"Mission: The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission cares for Washington's most treasured lands, waters, and historic places. State parks connect all Washingtonians to their diverse natural and cultural heritage and provide memorable recreational and educational experiences that enhance their lives.

### Core values:

Commitment to stewardship that transmits high quality park assets to future generations Dedication to outdoor recreation and public enjoyment that welcomes all our citizens to their public parks

Excellence in all we do

Involving the public in our policy development and decision making Support for one another as we translate our mission into reality"

It is clear when considering this set of mission and goals that managing Scotch broom, gorse, and other invasive species, mitigating risk of fire that threatens public wellness and safety, enhancing public recreation opportunities, and caring for the unique ecosystem that now exists should be paramount.

The removal of invasive species would reduce fire risk immensely, increase recreation opportunities, and provide resilience to an already existing ecosystem. A multifaceted approach to the restoration of Westport Light, including mechanical, biological, chemical, and cultural control methods for noxious weeds, could provide the public with a park that offers many additional recreation opportunities. These additional

opportunities could include increased wildlife interaction, with greater diversity and frequency of wildlife, particularly birds. Another recreation opportunity could be trails and boardwalks that enrich the experience of park visitors; making this particularly attractive is the storied history and transformation of the park, and the ecology of the second largest site for intercoastal dunes in the state of Washington. An enhanced trail system encourages more time outdoors in a physically accessible space for people to exercise, encouraging improved health and wellness. The accessibility of these types of trails deserves to be highlighted. Today I saw parents with young children on training bicycles, many elderly couples, a few groups of elderly women, more dog-walkers than I could count, children carrying kites, and individuals and couples who finished surfing all enjoying the full length of the trail, both directions.

I would also ask if additional stakeholders could be included,-- those most interested in the preservation, conservation, and restoration of the ecosystems that Westport Light State Park encompass and represent. There are opportunities to manage the park's health and ecosystem, some of which are already being utilized, but to a limited degree that could be increased. Resources like Noxious Weed Control Boards, 10,000 Years Institute, Department of Ecology, and State Parks itself offer a multitude of resources of all types, and all would likely be needed in different capacities to turn Westport Light into the park that City of Westport residents and visitors can access in meaningful and increasingly enjoyable ways.

I hope the commission can consider the opportunities that exist at Westport Light State Park and will consider management strategies for the park that don't include the construction of a golf course.
